# A New Church, Singing Together

In May 2020 the UMC has its next, and critical, General Conference. We now know that a group who see themselves as Evangelical United Methodists, bound together by their animosity toward LGBTQ people, plan to either exit the denomination or force others who don't hold to their exclusionary vision of the church to leave. In the last years, I've viewed this with tragic sadness. In many ways I still do.

**But:** Representatives of churches of the Western Jurisdiction of the UMC, which includes our Conference, had a meeting in November in which they declared firmly their intention to "refuse to limit the movement of God's Holy Spirit in the lives of all God's beloved children", and to "stand firm in grace and love".

They committed themselves to be the church we're meant to be, grounded in God's love and true to our Wesleyan roots "singing together a new, new song which echoes the old, old story of Jesus and his love which we have loved so long!"

What this shows is that the historical United Methodist vision will continue to unite millions in our spiritual family along with us at First UMC in Sacramento. We will be better than OK. We will be supported in our commitment to following the ways of Jesus.

So, while there may well be some type of division of the historic UMC coming, it will not be an end to our Methodist path. At my ordination I dedicated myself to living out my commitment to Christ **through** the United Methodist Church. I can joyfully and confidently encourage you to keep doing the same.

We are a church of God's love. That has always been who we're called to be and always will be.

# Dr. Martin C. Briggs, Abraham Lincoln, and Slavery

Undoubtedly, the most brilliant and influential minister in the early Methodist Church in California was Dr. Martin C. Briggs—the only minister to serve three pastoral appointments to our First Church: 1850-51; 1863-65; and 1875-78. In 1852 Briggs went to the General Conference in Boston to present the request of his California brethren that they be formed into an annual conference. The request was granted, and Briggs was seated as the first delegate.

Dr. Briggs was the first president of the Wesleyan College, forerunner of the University of the Pacific. He was also elected to serve the State Legislature as Chaplain. During his second term as pastor of First Church, in 1864 Briggs was elected a delegate to the National Convention which nominated Abraham Lincoln for his second presidential term. As chairman of the delegation, Briggs cast California's ten votes for Lincoln.

Perhaps the most important action of his career was the role Briggs played in helping to prevent California from becoming a slave state. A large number of Southerners had come to California in the 1850's and 1860's. Many wanted to change the state constitution to make slavery lawful. In the fall of 1851, a group of Southern politicians met in Wilmington, North Carolina, and spent some time planning to make California a slave state despite its constitution. Their deliberations resulted in a threefold scheme. The first was to rush in a large number of slaves under the promised protection of the governor. Then, if trouble followed, they planned to make a case in equity before a pro-slavery supreme court and achieve a modification of the law which would practically annul the constitution. Failing in this, they were to work for a constitutional convention under the pretense that the old one needed certain amendments, and then, having a majority in their favor, introduce a clause making slavery legal. The third plan, only to be undertaken in case neither of the others could be carried out, was to secure a division of the state and make the southern part open to slavery.

A circular explaining these plans was printed and secretly distributed; however, a copy of the circular fell into the hands of Dr. Briggs, who immediately communicated with President Lincoln in Washington. Lincoln went into action and prevented the plans in the circular from being carried out.
